Overview

The Head of School (HOS) reports to the School Board. He/she will oversee the schoolwide academic program and the day-to-day operations of the school. The HOS will lead the School in advancing its vision, mission, strategic intent, and initiatives. The position will also involve campus development and fundraising. The HOS will be an experienced international school leader who can engage the community to:

Unique

The Beacon School fosters a global perspective while remaining rooted in Filipino culture, values and language. It is the first school in the Philippines to receive authorization to deliver both the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) Primary Years Programme (PYP: Kinder – Grade 5) and Middle Years Programme (MYP: Grade 6-8).

International

Students learn through inquiry and activities based on an international curriculum framework shared by more than 2000 schools around the world.

Rooted in a clear Vision and mature Mission

The founders of the Beacon School envisioned a learning community where children grow to see themselves as agents of change in society. This underlying premise has guided the school's success since 2001.

Mission, Vision, & Philosophy

Mission

The Beacon School provides students with a global education that is both rigorous and balanced, that nurtures and inspires them toward their individual potential. The learning community encourages students to integrate a deep appreciation for Filipino culture with a respect for diversity, understanding the complexity of our world. They are challenged to become independent thinkers, confident communicators, and engaged citizens committed to act in service of society.





Vision

Beacon strives to foster a learning community that will inspire its students to be lifelong learners and agents of change who are guided by compassion and integrity.

Philosophy

The pedagogical philosophy supports inquiry based, conceptually driven, social – constructivist approaches to learning.

As an IB World School, Beacon students and members of the learning community strive to be:

The School

The Beacon School was registered with the Securities & Exchange Commission (SEC) on May 2, 2001,

and has been in continuous operations since then. The school began with 47 students with an early years program up to and inclusive of grade 4 and annually added grade levels to complete its middle school, up to grade 8. Prior to the pandemic, Beacon's enrollment reached 320, providing strong curricular and co-curricular programs. Throughout its young history, Beacon has maintained a strong commitment to service learning.





In response to COVID 19 quarantine measures, the transition to virtual learning has provided for the continuity of learning of its students with dedication from the teaching team and strong support from the parent community.

In recent years, to support increases in enrollment, Beacon has completed a multi-purpose gym and added renovated space to support our Middle Years Programme with a newly outfitted science lab and design and tech room that supports our robotics program. Additional plans for ongoing campus developments are very much on the horizon.

This year, Beacon School celebrated its 20th anniversary, proud:

- That the mission of the school continues to thrive and reaches increasing numbers of students and their families.
- That the community has faced the global pandemic with resilience.
- That the school is well poised to continue to thrive guided by school leaders who model empathy, service, and innovation.



Overview

The Beacon School is an independent, non-profit, secular, and co-educational school for students from Kinder to Grade 8. The school is accredited by the Department of Education of the Philippines and authorized by the International Baccalaureate to deliver the Primary Years Programme and Middle Years Programme. This internationally recognized curriculum framework provides students with the opportunity to develop an understanding of Filipino culture and heritage, as they actively engage in a high quality, inquiry-based program of study that fosters an awareness of complex global issues and the skills needed to address them.

The language of instruction is English. All students learn Filipino as an additional language. In the Middle Years Programme, students select either Mandarin Chinese or Spanish as a second additional language.

Filipino values engender a close-knit and caring school community that welcomes students of all nationalities. A dedicated and creative team of teachers work collaboratively to provide stimulating and authentic learning experiences with appropriate challenges for the unique needs of individual students.

To ensure innovative and best practices, Beacon is committed to the ongoing professional development of its teachers who work collaboratively to help realize Beacon's vision and mission.

Service learning is central to the school mission and is supported by formal agreements with partners as well as through student led initiatives.





Curriculum

IB Primary Years Programme

The Primary Years Programme focuses upon the total growth of the developing child, in addressing social, physical, emotional and cultural needs, in addition to academic welfare. The PYP combines the best research and practice from schools around the world, offering a comprehensive inquiry-based approach to teaching and learning.

Many subject areas, particularly Social Studies and Science, are focused upon in our PYP theme studies, also known as our Programme of Inquiry. In addition to the PYP themes, the students receive specific instruction in Language Arts, Science and Mathematics. We also offer a strong Philippine History, Culture and Values component as well as Art, Music and Physical Education. The children are also required to choose between Religious Education and World Religion. Our courses are fully recognized by the Department of Education, which means that, should they wish to, students can continue their education in other recognized schools and colleges in the Philippines.

In addition to the curriculum described above, we also have a range of special events each year. This year, these events, which are usually transdisciplinary in nature, include Filipino Week, International Week, the Christmas Holiday Celebration, and a Science, Technology, Arts and Math Week, as well as International and Book Week.


IB Middle Years Programme

Like the Primary Years Programme, the MYP is based on the best practice and research from around the world. Its structure is based on eight distinct subject areas, enhanced by the fundamental concepts described above, and by the global contexts which provide an authentic real-world lens through which to understand the concepts and bind the programme together. The subjects studied at the Beacon School include English, Individuals & Societies Science, Mathematics, Mandarin or

Spanish, Art, Music, Drama, Physical Education and Technology. At middle school level too, students continue their study of the Filipino language. In addition, they choose between Mandarin Chinese and Spanish as their second additional language. Grade 6 and 7 students choose between Religious Education and World Religion. In grade 8, all students study Ethics as part of the learning process for their Community Project.







In addition to the I.B. Middle Years curriculum, each year a range of special events occurs. This year, these events, which are usually transdisciplinary in nature, include Filipino Week, International Week, the Christmas Holiday Celebration, and a Science Week, as well as International and Book Week. A full program of after school activities and sport is available for all students.

In summary, we believe that our Middle School curriculum is rich, well-balanced and stimulating for our students. It is, too, an excellent preparation for the rigors of high school.

Technology

Beacon School programmes are supported by Information Technology (IT) policies and services that support 21st century learning. The aims of the IT programme are to expose students to the responsible use of technology to enhance learning.

In the Primary Years Programme, homeroom teachers integrate technology into the curriculum for units of inquiry. Students learn how to layout, create podcasts and videos, and analyze survey results, among a range of skills through available software programs. They also conduct research online, think critically about reliable information, and cite online sources appropriately.

In the Middle Years Programme, Information Technology, while a focus for Design, is also integrated into the curricular aims of other disciplines. Students continue to build on skills acquired in PYP.

Coding and robotics are offered through co-curricular programs.

The school has invested in iPads / carts for student use while on campus to create content and conduct research. The school has desktops in a Lab as well as iMacs for final production of content.

Students

Although the Beacon School does not rely on standardized test results to narrowly define students success, it is nonetheless proud that its students consistently outperform those from other like schools globally when measured by International Schools' Assessment. Beacon graduates thrive in prestigious high schools and colleges both in the Philippines and abroad.

More than attaining academic achievement, Beacon students are expected to become engaged citizens who value diversity of thoughts, respect different beliefs and are committed to fairness and justice. Dedicated to community development, they initiate service projects and respond to those in need. Beacon students balance academics with a range of co-curricular activities, including sports, the arts, publications and student government.





The student body is comprised largely of Filipino citizens. Another large percentage are dual citizen



holders from families where one parent is a Filipino citizen, and the other is a citizen of another country. Less than 5% of students are children of parents, neither of whom are Filipino citizens. By virtue of the education, professions, and travel experience of their parents, the students come from families that are well educated, well traveled, and are internationally minded. Languages spoken at home for the majority of students includes English, and for many, Filipino or at least one other language as well.

Faculty

Members of the Beacon School faculty are tapped for their leadership and innovation. Through their collaboration and creative approach, Beacon faculty set high standards for students, who are given individual attention as a result of small class sizes. Beacon faculty members also train teachers in public schools and help build capacity within educational institutions working toward more progressive approaches to learning.

The teaching team is comprised of Filipino nationals who are certified in education with 17% who hold a Masters degree and a significant number enrolled in programs to work toward an advanced degree. They are experienced in inquiry based practices and committed to ongoing professional development. They transitioned well to virtual learning and have begun planning for the implementation of blended learning.

Professional Development

Beacon dedicates 2% of its operating expenses to the Professional Development of its teaching team who model lifelong learning themselves.

Collaborative practices are strong, and peer mentoring and professional development through learning community practices provide the backbone of professional developments. These practices are complemented by in house full faculty training by external consultants.

In addition, on a rotating basis and aligned to strategic goals, teachers attend regional workshops offered through the IB, Chapters International, and Innovative Global Education.





Administration

The Academic Leadership Team is comprised of the Deputy Head of School, Primary Years Coordinator for PreK to Gr 1, Primary Years Coordinator for Gr 2 -5, Middle Years Coordinator, and Community Relations Coordinator overseeing Admissions, Beacon Parent Association Liaison work, Service Learning Partnerships, Communications, and External Relations. To oversee non-academic offices, the Managers Council comprises experienced professionals in their fields who oversee the following departments: Finance, IT, HR, Purchasing / Campus Maintenance, and Custodial / Security.

Board of Trustees

Beacon has 15 trustees who oversee the sustainability and strategic aims of the school and ensure that the school's mission is reflected in school policy and practices. Current board members nominate and elect new members to ensure diversity in expertise and representation. Trustees have backgrounds in law, banking, communications, telecommunications, management consultancy, real estate development, marketing, education, and public relations. Founding trustees and permanent members may be called to session for strategic guidance on issues of particular significance.

Community

The Beacon School is a local school that delivers an internationally recognized curriculum. The community is tight knit and cohesive. Parent engagement is high with active support of curricular and co-curricular programs at the school.

The community is composed of families 95% of whom are rooted in the Philippines though they represent many nationalities.

The Beacon School offers an important alternative for parents and students to:

- 1. Large international schools with the primary mission of serving the children of expatriate families posted in Manila. As such, these schools are characterized by a transient student population.
- 2. Large, local, parochial schools with the primary mission of serving the children of local families.

Similar to international schools Beacon provides:

- 1. Small class sizes
- 2. Inquiry based education
- 3. Interdisciplinary learning modules

Similar to the local traditional schools, Beacon provides:

- 1. Filipino language from K − 8
- 2. Religious instruction, with a choice between Christian Living Education, including spiritual formation, and World Religions, taught as a social studies subject
- 3. A curriculum that includes Filipino culture, history and values





In recent years Beacon has seen an increase in enrolment of Filipino and expat families moving back or moving to the Philippines from abroad. Children from these families were enrolled in an international school, at times an IB school, in the country where they moved from and the parents looked to continue their children's IB education when they moved to Manila.

The Beacon School is located near the Central Business District of Makati, and the newly developed commercial district of Bonifacio



Global City as well as the exclusive residential villages bordering both. These two business districts include the Philippine Stock Exchange, multinational corporate offices, national corporate headquarters, the growing Business and Knowledge Process Outsourcing sectors, five star hotels and exclusive retail outlets. Many of the school's students are from the upper and upper middle classes. They commute from nearby residential villages as well as neighborhoods several kilometers from the school.

Over the years, Beacon School and its students have engaged in service learning and action projects to benefit both the community in the immediate vicinity, in the National Capital Region, and in response to needs across the country. Service learning is embedded in the Beacon curriculum and families are supportive of student led initiatives.

Campus

The Beacon School facilities comprises 10,297sqm of educational and office space for its exclusive use on a compound leased from Philippine Center for Population and Development, Inc. (PCPD). The total area does not include significant square meters of common spaces including the front entrance lobby, main hallways, and the canteen.



Typical classroom sizes range from 50 - 65 sqm with larger sizes for Science and Design. Additional facilities for student learning include dedicated spaces for specialized classes, performances, and outdoor sports as well as student services as follows:
