Position Overview

The AAS Director is the educational and operational leader for the school collaborating with the leadership team and the Board of Directors in achieving academic and holistic excellence for students aspired for in the AAS Mission and ensures students are reaching for the AAS vision in alignment with our Core Values. The Director collaborates in the leadership of the core business of the school, education, as well as in all operational departments ensuring alignment for supporting student learning. The general supervision of all staff of the school is the Director's responsibility as shared with the schoolwide leadership team. In addition, the Director is responsible for the implementation of Board policy through day-to-day procedures and has direct responsibility for the management, organization, and supervision of all school activities as well as the development and implementation of the AAS Strategic Priorities in collaboration with schoolwide leadership.

The School

The Anglo-American School of Moscow, Russia (AAS) was established in 1949 in the pressroom of the British Embassy and chartered by the Founding Embassies, American, British, and Canadian Embassies, for the dependents of the employees of those missions. It began with the mission of supporting the dependents of the employees of these missions and with a vision to grow to enroll students representing many nationalities. AAS has been a diplomatic school since originally organized, operating as an extension of the Founding Embassies for seven decades. This organizational status is changing to a Non-Commercial Organization (NKO) in Russia (see School Status below). Our 71 year history was an evolution to include the 59 nationalities that we serve today with the following guiding statements (Mission, Vision, and Core Values).

School

History

The Anglo-American School of Moscow was formed over 72 years ago as a diplomatic school as a part of the three Founding Embassies, American, British, and Canadian. Over the past twenty years there have been ongoing conversations between the Founding governments and the Russian government about transitioning the legal status of the school.



AAS is now fully engaged in transitioning AAS' school status to more closely resemble other international schools across the globe, a local, not-for-profit, educational organization. This is a significant step that AAS, the school Board and leadership, have been working towards for some time. Founding Embassies and AAS leadership representatives are collaborating with Russian authorities to complete the transition as quickly and seamlessly as possible, while retaining AAS' unique character that has developed over seven decades. Our ultimate goal is to continue student learning at AAS fundamentally the same as it has been for the past seven decades with minimal noticeable impact for students. The first major steps have been taken but there is still much work to be done. The NKO transition is highly complex and unique in that this type of transition has never been done before in Russia and has evolved from political challenges. This process is undefined and can be unpredictable at times as AAS creates a new school and eligible local NKO organization from a 70-year history as a diplomatic entity. The next Director will be instrumental in ensuring that AAS continues to actively engage with all aspects of the school community as well as the governmental authorities in Russia on defining and refining as the transition continues through an evolving implementation for AAS.

Specifically, at this time, AAS has successfully registered the school's new Russian legal entity (Non-Commercial Organization – NKO), received certification for select facilities, and received our limited educational license. This license allows AAS to take major steps towards completing the school's transition by streamlining visa processes outside of diplomatic channels, which has already begun. Importantly, this mechanism will also expand AAS's ability to recruit highly qualified new expat teachers, which we did this summer, from diverse nationalities moving forward along with operating as a registered entity in Russia for all operations.



Accreditation

AAS is fully accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) and seeking our next accreditation through the ACE protocol. AAS is recognized as an International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) World School with PYP and IBDP learning frameworks. AAS engages in international membership in the Central and Eastern European School Association (CEESA) with the Director currently serving on the CEESA Executive Committee as well as being a member of AISH, AAIE, CIS, and the European Council of International Schools (ECIS).

Academics

The AAS learning experiences are grounded in the Learning model noted below and aligned with our Strategic Priorities. AAS is an organization where everyone, adults and students alike, are learning on an ongoing basis. Our students engage with the AAS international curriculum, which ensures a foundational learning in English/Language Arts, mathematics, science and social studies. Russian, French or Spanish, art, music, computer skills and physical education. The Elementary School offers the IBO Primary Years Program articulated through an age and developmentally appropriate Middle School learning experiences that leads to our college-preparatory High School where all students obtain a High School Diploma that can be supplemented with International Baccalaureate certificates or a full IB Diploma.

The Student Support Services team is led by a Schoolwide Learning Director and includes an educational psychologist, a speech and language pathologist, Occupational therapist, and divisional specialist teachers (Learning Support and English as an Additional Language) who provide support to students identified with unique learning needs in the mild to moderate range.

In line with our Mission and our Strategic Priority of Learning Beyond the Classroom, the school has well-established and enriching opportunities that extend beyond academics including after school activities, clubs, athletics, service learning, and Mother Tongue. Also, there are established and evolving partnerships for classroom without walls experiences and service learning opportunities locally, regionally, and internationally.







Students & Community

The Moscow campus currently provides learning experiences for about 830 students in Grades Pre-K through Grade 12 with an average class size of 16 to 18 students. Our students represent 59 countries coming from 25 Embassies and Consulates, more than 70+ international companies in Moscow, as well as prominent Russian companies. Our student body is quite diverse with our students excelling academically as well as in a wide range of activities, clubs, sports, and service-learning opportunities.



The AAS Community is also inclusive and diverse as well as supportive through ongoing partnerships with parents and evolving relationships in service learning and learning through community expertise. The Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) is a volunteer parent-led group of individuals who are active and engaged in support of learning at AAS as well as in creating ongoing and enriching opportunities for community building and welcoming new families into our community.

Leadership & Faculty

The school has 295 staff members coming from 26 different nationalities, a group of highly qualified individuals who place a priority on students and value ongoing growth and collaboration. Our staff have shown great resilience and flexibility during this pandemic as they ensured the optimum learning model for our students alongside balancing safety. AAS partners with the international recruiting firms to identify the best fit educators and locally seeks to attract the highest qualified educational and operational support staff as a well-respected employer in Moscow.

AAS is fortunate to have dedicated and committed leadership that includes both divisional and schoolwide leaders as well as teacher leaders who collaborate within their grade level and department teams as well as with division leaders. The Division Leadership teams include grade level and department chair teacher leadership, learning coaches, Elementary and Secondary Learning Coordinators, a Principal at each of the elementary, middle, and high school divisions with Associate Principals at each division.

In addition to division leadership, schoolwide leadership also includes the AAS Director, Deputy Director, Director of Finance and Operations, and schoolwide Directors for Admissions, Community Relations, Compliance, Digital Learning, Human Resources, Student Support Services, and Technology.





Governance

A nine, voting member Board of Directors currently governs the diplomatic school. This Board consists of five embassy representatives appointed by the ambassadors of the three sponsoring embassies (with three non-voting alternates), the PTO President, three elected members from the AAS community, and one non-voting teacher representative. The AAS Diplomatic School Board meets about six to seven times during each year, including a retreat each school year. The Board also has standing and ad-hoc Board committees including Executive, Finance & Facilities, and Policy & Governance to support the school.

In addition to the AAS Diplomatic School Board, AAS has a Non-Commercial Organization (NKO) Board that is supporting the transition in school status, which is in progress as noted below. The current NKO Board includes five members, three from the U.S. Embassy, one community member, and the AAS Diplomatic School Director. The AAS Diplomatic Board will be transitioning to the NKO Board with a similar structure as AAS moves through the school status transition.

Campus

The Anglo-American School of Moscow campus opened on the current site in August 2000. It is purpose-built, with facilities specifically designed to accommodate educational and extracurricular opportunities for our students. The Anglo-American School of Moscow (AAS) is a 30,000 square meter, state-of-the-art building in Northwest Moscow nestled between the Moscow Canal and the Pokrovskoye-Glebevo Park off Volokolamskoye Schosse, 20 minutes from the city center. The school stands on 6.5 hectares of land adjacent to the Pokrovsky Hills housing community where many AAS families live. This purpose-built facility is the culmination of effort and commitment to our community and Learning at AAS by the three Founding Embassies (the US, UK, and Canadian), the AAS Leadership team, and the amazing educational and operational staff as well as hundreds of volunteers from our parent and corporate communities whose strong belief in AAS have created these facilities for learning.



The AAS Moscow campus and facilities include a range of learning spaces including:

- 85 dedicated classrooms in the elementary, middle, and high schools
- 3 innovation labs, one in each division
- 8 science labs for middle and high schools
- Visual and Performing Arts Learning: 5 art, 6 music, 2 black boxes, and a 630-seat theater
- Activities and Sports facilities: aquatics center with 2 swimming pools for learners and more advanced swimmers, 2 large gyms, a state-of-the-art fitness center, 3 playing fields (one with



artificial turf), 2 artificial turf developmentally designed spaces to support physical growth at the elementary level, two ice rinks created on hard surface courts as well as the summer sports such as cross country running and winter sports of cross-country skiing and sledding in the nearby forest

- Well-resourced library with flexible and informal learning spaces
- Two dining spaces and a common, connected student lounge space with two food kiosks
- Bring your own device (BYOD) and wireless Internet access throughout the school

Location

Moscow is the capital and largest city in Russia with a metropolitan population of over 12.5 million. It is the largest European city and one of the world's largest urban areas. The country's political, economic, religious, financial, educational, and transportation center, Moscow is located on the Moscow River in the Central Federal District of Russia. It is the site of the Moscow Kremlin, which serves as the ceremonial residence of the President of Russia.

Moscow has a temperate climate with warm summers and cold winters. Typical high temperatures in the warm months of June, July and August are around 22 °C (72 °F); in the winter, temperatures normally drop to approximately -12 °C (10 °F).

Moscow's world-famous museums and galleries are some of the largest and most significant in the world. Frequent art exhibitions offer both the new and classic and are derived from diverse branches of the visual arts - painting, photography, and sculpture.

With its large number of massive parks, Moscow is a very green city compared to other cities of comparable size in Western Europe and the United States. Biking, walking, roller blading and cross-country skiing are very common park activities. The city also possesses a large number of various sports facilities.

There are two primary commercial airports serving Moscow: Domodedovo (DME) and Sheremetyevo (SVO) International Airports with the host country airline, Aeroflot, flying direct flights to most parts of the world. Local transport includes taxis, Ubers, buses, and the Moscow Metro, a metro system famous for its art, murals, mosaics, and ornate chandeliers, serving more than nine million passengers daily.
